CORNER-STONE OF THE CONFED-ERATE MONUMENT LAID

Under the Auspiers of Norfolk Lodge No. 1, A. F. & A. H .- Confederate Veterans and Baughters of the Confederacy Atlend Brief Parade of Veterans and Masons.

About the first day of March, 1868, ing a monument to the soldiers and sailors of the Confederacy who fell during the war between the States. Yesterday afternoon there was laid the corner-stone of this token of remembrance, when the hopes and plans of the Norfolk Monument Association and Pickett-Buchanan Camp, C. V., were realized in part. The fullness of the expectations will be theirs when, on Memorial Day, this shaft of gray will be formally unveiled and will stand, with its sixty-eight feet of height, as a lasting tribute to those gallant men who died for their honor and their fire-

Congregated around Commercial Place prior to and during the brief but impressive ceremonies incident to the corner-stone laying there was a crowd of interested spectators, men, women and children, numbering about 2006. Of course but very few of these could hear anything that was said, and yet so WANTED.-AGENTS TO WORK ON hearty was their interest that none left. Just to the south of where the shaft will be erected and where the cornerstone was laid was a large platform, on which the ceremonies were conducted. On this stand, besides Masons and members of Pickett-Buchanan Camp, there were seated many members of Pickett-Buchanan Chapter, Daughters of the Confederacy, and the choir, which sang the hymns incident to the exercises. Around the stand had gathered the throng of people who awaited the arrival of the Masons and veterans. who made a brief parade before reaching the place.

The parade proper started from the Masonic Temple, at the corner of Brewer and Freemason streets. It was a little late in feaving, according to the official programme. Pickett-Buchanan Camp.
